

Conflict Minerals Statement

Background

The US government adapted a new law to address the exploitation and trade of "Conflict Minerals" that help finance armed conflict in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and the following adjoining countries: Angola, Burundi, the Central African Republic, Rwanda, South Sudan, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia.

Risk analysis

The term "Conflict Minerals" is defined as columbite-tantalite, also known as coltan from which tantalum is derived; cassiterite (tin); gold; wolframite (tungsten) or their derivatives. During production of transformers, coils and other inductive components, Dantrafo is using the material tin which is included in the above mentioned list of minerals. In order to make sure that Dantrafo comply with the requirements related to "Conflict Minerals" we have required our supplier for tin material to ensure that the material does not originate from any of the listed countries.

Supplier Statement

Tin material is being sourced from the supplier "Boliden" which have investigated their sourcing of materials and made sure that there are no "Conflict Minerals" originating from the listed countries, involved in their production.

We hereby declare that to the best of our knowledge our products comply with the requirements related to "Conflict Minerals".
